Retired in 2007 as Associate Professor of Biology and Environmental Science at Grenfell Campus after 35 years of service.

Henry Mann, a botanist scholar, and long past his formal departure from Grenfell, has continued to support the university and his community in nature-related educational programs and activities. He continues to contribute to the development of the campus herbarium; offers guest lectures to students on topics that use the herbarium as a resource, and according to one colleague, is an irreplaceable member of the herbarium curating committee. As a valued member of his local communities of Pasadena and Humber Valley, Henry participates in nearly all of the annual NL mushroom forays; works with Humber Natural History Society serving on the board, authors articles for Nature NL, serves with NL Wildflower Society, leading field trips and producing articles for the newsletter; has developed nature trail and program for Pasadena Ski and Nature Park, assists the Town of Pasadena as a member of the walking trail committee. For the provincial government he has authored and contributed to field guides with provincial scope. He has made frequent contributions to several publications including: *Omphalina, Sarracenia* and *Osprey*. He was a major contributor of both text and photographs to a new Limestone Barrens book, has made major contributions to a book of NL wildflowers and currently has in publication an unreleased book on NL flesh-eating plants.
