- Communities both of a physical nature but also groups of interested parties who come a common background or, in the case of Aboriginal communities, from an Indigenous background
- So you may be engaging Aboriginal economic development officers in Canada as a community but also a specific, geographical community such as Membertou in Cape Breton

 - Enablers and barriers
 - Challenges and Risks
 - Failures and success







- Different
 - Treat as a separate Nation they were here first!
 - Importance of politics
 - Spiritual and cultural knowledge

 - Consent not consult
 - Sense of distrust of authority figures

























- Engagement with Aboriginal Communities good practices
