


#### We had participants from across the province:

#### **ETUAPTMUMK**



At the Dialogues we aim to practice Etuaptmumk, which means "two-eyed seeing" in Mi'kmaw.

Etuaptmumk is knowledge coexistence for the benefit of all people.

To practice it, we have to see that our knowledge can overlap but remains distinct. We do not throw away or relinquish if we can find good, we keep all the good for the mutual benefit of all.

Etuaptmumk is a philosophical concept, not a research method, that guides Indigenous and non-Indigenous people working together to ask if their respect for other perspectives is stronger than their reliance on their own viewpoint.



#### **SOCIAL FINANCE**



Social finance is a tool that can be used to co-create community entrepreneurship.

Social finance uses standard financial tools and instruments to improve the economic, social and environmental values that organizations deliver.

The Canadian government defines social finance as "an approach to mobilizing private capital that delivers a social dividend and an economic return to achieve social and environmental goals".

Social finance often comes with a requirement for impact measurement and reporting.

#### **PLACE & INNOVATION**



Following the social finance panel discussion, participants formed four groups for a heritage walking tour of St. Anthony, taking in some of the key assets of the community.

These observations were then used as the basis for an exercise where participants brainstormed and presented innovative ideas related to two initiatives in St. Anthony:

- Public Transit SABRI will develop public transit and is seeking a way to maximize its use. It will become a public space that embeds the growth of local businesses, arts and other local potentialities.
- Agriculture SABRI has tapped into the agricultural sector with the Grenfell Garden to raise public awareness of food security, greenhouse and hydroponic farm. The current challenge is to expand the agricultural business and community buy-in.

Teams presented their innovative ideas for public transit and agriculture in St. Anthony.












## **BOOK LAUNCH**


