Kathryn Harrison is a Professor of Political Science at the University of British Columbia, where she has been a faculty member since 1993. She has a Bachelor's degree in engineering from the University of Western Ontario, Master's degrees in political science and chemical engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and a Ph.D. in political science from UBC. Before entering academia, she worked as a chemical engineer and as a policy analyst for both Environment Canada and the United States Congress. Dr. Harrison is the author of *Passing the Buck: Federalism and Canadian Environmental Policy*, coauthor of *Risk, Science, and Politics: Regulation of Toxic Substances in Canada and the United States*, and has also edited several volumes, the most recent of which is *Global Commons, Domestic Decisions: The Comparative Politics of Climate Change*. Her current research focuses on environmental regulation in the context of economic globalization, instrument choice in climate policy, and the comparative politics of climate change. Her awards include the KD Srivastava Award from UBC Press, Fulbright Fellowships (1999 and 2006) and a Killam Research Fellowship.
