CAMPUS FOOD BANK

Since we have been encouraging WAMUN members to donate to the campus food bank at our meetings, we asked Noel Veitch to provide us with some information about the food back.

The Campus Food Bank had another successful year in 2004. We provided food to several thousand people, roughly half of whom were children.

While the university students are our main target group, we also serve former students, a few employees, a few students attending other postsecondary institutions, and people referred to us by the Community Food Sharing Association. The latter referrals are usually people with disabilities that prevent their going to other food banks.

In December just past, we provided more then 130 Christmas hampers, a big increase over the previous year.

Donations of food and money are certainly needed on an ongoing basis. We buy such food as fresh and canned milk, eggs, apple and orange juice. We spend about half of our income on fresh milk.

Our food bank is located on campus in Corte Real in space provided free by the university. We are an independent charitable organization and have our own board of directors. Our food bank is run entirely by volunteers.

Women Fishes These Days by Brenda Grzetic (Fernwood Publishing) is cited in "Books by Alumni" in the Fall/Winter issue of the Luminus. Brenda held a WAMUN graduate scholarship in 2001 – 2002! Brenda's research into the role of women in the fisheries became the thesis for her masters' degree. She received her M.A. in 2002 and is currently working on a PhD.

Women Fishes These Days was reviewed in the Alternatives Journal (Vol. 30, No. 5, Nov/Dec 2004):

'A glimpse into a nervous system' is the first chapter of Brenda Grzetic's book, which grew out of her Masters thesis research at Memorial University, Newfoundland. By the time I had finished reading this slender volume, I was feeling nervous myself, on behalf of the women who venture into the North Atlantic in small boats. The book is woven from many strands: discussions of fisheries management theory and practice, the history of the collapse of the northern cod fishery, and, most importantly, the stories and perceptions of women who work in that fishery. ...

One of our members, **Error! Contact not defined.**, has been named to the Community Editorial Board of The Evening Telegram. She was kind enough to answer of few of your editor's questions about this position.

What made you decide to apply to be on the board?

It all started when I went to Israel as the War on Iraq was about to break out and I had arranged with the Telegram to write a series of letters describing my journey. On my return I was surprised by the widespread reaction I received - it turned out that the readers found my viewpoint special, and my writing interesting. Thus encouraged, when recently The Telegram advertised that they were looking for candidates for this coming year Editorial Board, I felt it was a challenge worth tackling.

Your first editorial dealt with the 'water shortage' or, rather that we have a 'supply shortage', not a water shortage. Did you read Andy Wells' reply to you? What did you make of it?

I was flattered to see that Mr. Andy Wells found my piece to be disturbing enough to answer in length. That in itself is a compliment. As to his reply – yes, I

read it, and wasn't too impressed. I did not appreciate his attempt to flood us with details and statistics instead of supplying us with a plan and a promise to solve the problem. In a nutshell he claimed – everything had been done, or is being done, everything is fine, there is no problem. This kind of approach is an insult to the intelligence of the readers, and I'd like to say: Mr. Wells, if all is perfect and dandy, then where is our water?

How often will your columns be appearing in The Telegram?

Each member of the Editorial Board writes six pieces throughout the year, which would come to about once in two months.

What other topics do you plan to write about?

Our task, as the Editorial Board, is to serve as a tool for the community to voice its views on local (provincial) issues of concern and debate. That is why I welcome suggestions for topics. As much as I love Newfoundland and Labrador and enjoy the beautiful things it has to offer, my job, as I understand, it is to bring forth the grievances.

I wish to take the opportunity and thank all of you for reading my pieces and commenting on them. I find the feedback extremely important and do keep in mind that I do not expect everyone to agree with what I say. If my writing causes a debate, then I have achieved what I set out to do.
