ABOUT OUR MEMBERS

It all started with Elke Molgaard! In the spring, on one of our Tuesday walks, Elke said that she had been thinking about how many members of WAMUN have talents and interests of which others might not be aware. She suggested interviewing some of them for the newsletter and recommended Leila Clase. Those of us who have walked with Leila know that if one has a question about a plant, you can ask Leila and get a well-considered answer. So recently your editor visited Leila and asked her a few questions about her interests.

Leila Clase

When I went to interview Leila, we focused on her interest in flowers, gardening and herbs, in particular. When Leila was in high school, they had separate courses in botany and biology. In botany, they were required to collect, press, identify and label plants, with their Latin names and all. This sparked her interest in the organization of the plant kingdom. She went on to study languages, not biology, and so the interest lay dormant until she came to St. John's.

Once here, Leila started to develop her interest in herbs of all kinds. Her family responded to her interest by giving her books. In the old days, herbs were used not only for cooking, but also as medicines and for other household uses. So today Leila's herb garden contains costmary and hyssop in addition to tarragon, dill, fennel and other cooking herbs.

In 1972, Bernard Jackson started to develop Oxen Pond Botanical Garden, which was opened to the public in the mid-70s. He sent out letters to some people that he knew were interested in the welfare of the Garden and about twenty-five people responded to form the group we know as the Friends of the Garden (FOG). It was an informal group at that time. The Garden was open to the public on Sundays and members of the group manned the desk and walked the trails and were available to answer questions.

In the early eighties the Garden began a more active propagation program of plants using seeds and cuttings, which led to FOG plant sales for fund raising as there were always seedlings and rooted cuttings surplus to the Garden's needs. At the beginning, there was only a fall sale and perhaps only 25 kinds of plants. The sales have grown to include many dozens of kinds of plants and there is a spring sale that is larger than the fall one. Although the horticulturist identifies the plants, Leila puts her interest in "the organization of the plant kingdom" to work by making the plant list for the sale.

In the latter part of the '80s, FOG held their first herb plant sale. The horticulturist instigated it and of course it was a great lot of work. There was even a sheet of recipes, decorated by Sylvia Cullum. Once it was done, there was a short period of wondering what to do next, before they were back at preparing for other sales and figuring out other ways to help the Botanical Garden.

Today, FOG is more highly organized than it was in the early years. Members may be either supporting members or active members. Of the active members, the most active is the horticultural group, which meets every Wednesday morning. Part of this group focuses on dried flowers, which they prepare for sale in the gift shop.

Another group continues to develop the wild life garden, which is just on the edge of the cultivated area of the Botanical Garden. They started to develop this garden in 1992 and it was opened to the public two years later. The idea is to create a garden that is attractive to wild life: birds, bees, and butterflies — which we are likely to notice — and also insects and other smaller wild life.

It is always a delight to visit the home of Leila and Howard Clase. Even on a blustery October morning, one is greeted with a burst of color from the flowers lining the road up to their house. When one leaves, one is very likely to be carrying a little bouquet of flowers plucked from their garden. Thank you, Leila, for consenting to be interviewed!
