

Henrietta Harvey Lecturer & Women's Studies Speaker

The Department of Women Studies kicks off its inaugural semester by welcoming one of the most noted scholars of women's studies in Canada. Dr. Joy Parr, Canada Research Chair in Technology, Culture and Risk at the University of Western Ontario, will be in St. John's from Sept. 17-21.

On Tuesday, **Sept. 18** at 8 p.m. in Rm. A-1046, Dr. Parr will deliver a public Henrietta Harvey Distinguished Lecture titled Hooked Rugs of Naked Ladies: Marital Life and Material and Emotional Strategies in the Shadow of Base Gagetown.

In the 1950s, community members were moved from woodlots and meadows to make way for the military base at Gagetown, New Brunswick. This talk focuses on one couple, their lives and work before the move, and the strategies the woman developed to help him manage the depression that overcame him. Songs written for and about them, and examples of their craft work, will be featured.

On Friday, **Sept. 21** at 4 p.m. in the Science Building, SN 4087, Dr. Parr will launch the 2007-08 Women's Studies Speakers Series with an examination of Ruth Schwartz Cowan's classic text *More Work for Mother*, and subsequent research into domesticity and technology.

WAMUN Member Receives CCA Doctoral Dissertation Award

Congratulations to Dr. Lynda Younghusband who recently received the Canadian Counselling Association (CCA) Doctoral Dissertation Award for "High School Teacher's Perceptions of Their Working Environment: A Grounded Theory Study.", a doctor of philosophy dissertation completed in October 2005 through the Faculty of Medicine.

Originally a nurse with qualifications from Ottawa Civic Hospital School of Nursing and the Royal Canberra Hospital, Australia, Lynda changed professions, completing a bachelor degree in vocational education at Memorial University and a Master of Education in psychology counselling. Lynda is presently a sessional lecturer in the Faculty of Education and School of Nursing at MUN, having taught with the Avalon East School Board for many years.

The CCA is a national association of professionally trained counsellors dedicated to the enhancement of the counselling profession in Canada. Dr. Younghusband is presently a member if its Board of Directors and chair of the CCA Ethics Committee.

Update on MUN Governance

A consultants' report released in April recommended the creation of a second university in Newfoundland and Labrador by converting Sir Wilfred Grenfell College in Corner Brook into a university within a Memorial University system. The provincial government indicated its support for that proposal..

During the summer, Memorial's Board of Regents met to discuss the matter. The Board subsequently announced that it prefers the current one-university system, with provisions to increase the autonomy of Grenfell College. The issue has generated considerable discussion in the province and among alumni and others interested in the university and postsecondary education.
