

Commentary on Labour Market Performance in Newfoundland and Labrador

MARCH 2017

Whilst March 2017 saw Newfoundland & Labrador win big at the Brier, estimates from the Labour Force Survey (LFS) suggest less triumphant results in the labour market. Figures show a further increase in Newfoundland &

Labrador's unemployment rate, bringing it to 14.9% (Figure 1) in March 2017. This is higher than the rate in other major oil producing provinces (Alberta (AB) 8.4% and Saskatchewan (SK) 6%). Between March 2016 and March 2017, Saskatchewan experienced a decrease in its unemployment rate while Alberta had a moderate increase of 1.2 percentage points. In NL, the unemployment rate rose by 1.9 percentage points.

Table 1 highlights some of the key characteristics of NL's labour force. The size of the province's labour force increased by 2100 persons between February and March 2017, however the labour force has remained below its March 2016 level - being 1300 (0.8%) smaller in March 2017. There was no change in the estimated number of employed persons between February and March 2017 but compared to March 2016, employment fell by

6000 (2.6%). The number of unemployed persons in March 2017 increased by 5.6% (or 2100) compared to the previous month and by 13.5% (or 4700) compared to March 2016. The unemployment rate has increased by 1.9 percentage points since March 2016 and by 0.7 percentage points since February 2017.



Figure 2 shows monthly changes in employment and unemployment for the province. There has been guite a bit of variation over the past 12 months. Unemployment fell in five months and employment grew in just four months out of 12. Over the year, unemployment grew by 4700 and employment decreased by 6000. In the last month of the period (February to March 2017), unemployment increased by 2100 with no change in employment.


Percentage changes in unemployment (number of persons) is compared across provinces for

March 2016 to March 2017 and for February to March 2017 in Figure 3. Over the year, unemployment fell by 4.8% for the country as a whole - falling in all provinces except NL and AB (unemployment increased by 13.5% in NL and 18.2% in AB). In the month to March 2017 however, unemployment increased across the country, on average (by 2.1%), and in all provinces except SK, MN and NB. Over this month, unemployment NL saw the third highest increase in the number of persons unemployed whilst AB experienced a smaller relative increase (2.2%).
