# WORKSHOP IV: RESEARCH REPORTS AND NEXT STEPS

he Thriving Regions Partnership Process is a Harris Centre-led regional development program designed to help regions determine priority areas where they might be able to work with Memorial University researchers. The process consists of four different workshops and it supports between one and three research projects with focus on the region.

The workshop held in Deer Lake on January 31, 2024 for the fourth and final workshop in the process. The goal of the final workshop is for the researchers to present their research results and gather feedback before submitting their final reports and for the regional participants to have a discussion around possible next steps given the results of the research projects. The two researchers presenting in Deer Lake were Dale Jarvis and Dr. Carlos Bazan. There were 35 registrants at the workshop.

#### RESEARCH PROJECTS

Dale Jarvis and Dr. Diane Tye's "Humber Valley Traditional Skills: A Needs and Opportunities Assessment" provided an asset map and direction for further developing the rich cultural traditions and skills in the region. This project, among other things, called

for entrepreneurship supports and education that would enable knowledge holders to develop a range of ventures of commercial and cultural value.

The second project, "Developing a Business Model for Accessible Entrepreneurship Training Programs in Rural Newfoundland & Labrador," developed by Drs. Carlos Bazan and Jennifer Dyer, offered answers to entrepreneurship education needs.

The researchers' presentations were followed by group discussions focused on possible follow up activities and clarifications on the projects.

The next section will summarize those conversations.

#### **SMALL GROUP DISCUSSION**


The first table discussion focused on ways that the participants could enhance and use the projects to the benefit of the region. The specific questions the participants tried to answer were: 1) What could be done to make these projects even more useful and relevant to the region; and 2) How can we use these projects to help Humber Valley become a thriving region?

The second discussion focused on concrete steps that the participants could make to build on both projects' strengths and results. The questions the discussions tried to answer were: 1) Is there a project or activity that we can move forward with the people and assets present; who around this table is willing to engage; what will we do over the next 60 days; what can Memorial University offer at this point that would be helpful?


#### TRADITIONAL SKILLS PROJECT

The participants recognized several possible avenues that could move this project forward in ways to benefit the region. Much of the discussion focused on better communications and connections within the region including increasing intergenerational knowledge transfer opportunities, and improving connections with tourism operators, local schools and entrepreneurs. There were also discussions around appropriate compensation schemes for the traditional knowledge holders that did not

necessarily involve monetary compensation. Questions were also raised around who has access to the inventory and whether it would be possible to create a "living" document that would build on the work completed to date.



For immediate action, participants decided to create a Facebook group focused on Humber Valley heritage and traditional skills. It was emphasized that the group should have local volunteer moderators and support individuals or groups able and willing to offer training, workshops or organize other events with a focus on heritage and traditional skills. ## ENTREPRENEURSHIP EDUCATION


The participants in the Entrepreneurship Education small table discussions had a robust conversation around many outstanding questions including the actual curriculum, and the way that it would be delivered to the potential students in the region. They also had a range of questions focused on Memorial's Community Hubs.

The questions ranged from the impact on the groups and organizations already delivering similar training, to intended audiences and the importance of face-to-face training. Dr.

Bazan was on hand to answer some of those

questions and has committed to connecting with local organizations to discuss details of the program and potential partnerships in the region.


Jennifer Buxton from the Grenfell Office of Public Engagement and Bojan Fürst from the Harris Centre provided additional information on Community Hubs.



In addition, the participants identified a lack of collaboration between municipalities in the region as a problem and asked if it would be possible to provide a brief bio and contact information for all of the attendees as a way to create a network and understand people's roles and responsibilities in the region. The Harris Centre committed to including that information in the report as long as it is voluntarily disclosed. Appendix 2 contains this information.
