CHAIRS

UArctic Chairs are highly qualified academics who serve as academic drivers in a broad area of relevance to the Arctic. They implement and drive collaborative actions in research and education among UArctic members and Thematic Networks, and build partnerships with the broader Arctic community.

DR. BING CHEN

UARCTIC CHAIR IN MARINE AND COASTAL ENVIRONMENTAL ENGINEERING

Appointed in December 2023 for a fiveyear term, Dr. Chen has since participated in nine UArctic events, meetings, and chair sessions, three thematic networks, five research projects, and 18 publications and presentations in 2023. Additionally, Dr. Chen has been leading the PEOPLE Network, led a forum proposal for The International Water Association (IWA), and participated in Lloyds Register Foundation (LRF) Initiative.

DR. KIRK ANDERSON

UARCTIC CHAIR IN SCHOOL EFFECTIVENESS AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

Appointed in October 2022 for a five-year term, Dr. Anderson has attended Arctic forums at MUN and has held meetings within the UArctic structure online and face-to-face. Currently, Dr. Anderson is working on a Special Edition of the Morning Watch Journal of Policy Analysis feature on the role and research of the Arctic Chairs, and is hosting an "Arctic Chairs" Forum for Northern and Indigenous scholars.

VICE PRESIDENTS AND STAFF

UArctic is a decentralized organization, with offices, programs, and other functions hosted at member institutions in the Circumpolar North. The daily operations of the Network are managed through a Secretariat based at the University of Lapland in Rovaniemi, Finland.

As part of UArctic's Senior Leadership Team, Sheila Downer, Northern Liaison with the Harris Centre, serves as the Vice President of Northern Community Engagement.

Supported through Global Affairs Canada funding, Memorial University hosts Lisa Goulet as Membership Engagement Coordinator on behalf of UArctic. The main focus of this position is supporting increased communication and collaborative engagement among members within Canada and the Circumpolar North.





GLOBAL ARCTIC LEADERSHIP INITIATIVE

Global Affairs Canada's Global Arctic Leadership Initiative (GALI) is a funding program that aims to strengthen Canada's global leadership in the Arctic. Memorial University has partnered with the University of the Arctic and Yukon University to help foster collaboration in Northern Canada and ensure the continuation of Canada's initiative to build circumpolar academic cooperation.

Memorial oversees two funding opportunities through the GALI initiative, including the Indigenous and Northern Collaborative Research and Education Fund and the Indigenous and Northern Relationship Development Fund. To date, the funding programs have supported 17 projects, including seven Memorial-led projects. Total project funds committed to date is \$597,916 supporting Canadian UArctic Members in Indigenous and Northern collaborations.

INDIGENOUS AND NORTHERN RELATIONSHIP DEVELOPMENT FUND



HARMONIZING CLIMATE CHANGE WITH SCHOOLS THROUGH COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

This project fosters connections among Northern youth (grades 7-10) from Newfoundland and Norway, engaging in climate action activities. Partnering with Climate Collective and Brilliant Labs, diverse youth and Indigenous students collaborate on monthly online meetings, realizing climate change as a global responsibility. Burke and Bjøru visit each class, culminating in a public exhibit showcasing students' climate change creations. The initiative builds relationships, awareness of climate change, and community involvement in regional climate action.







INDIGENOUS AND NORTHERN RELATIONSHIP DEVELOPMENT FUND



SCHOOL OF ARCTIC AND SUBARCTIC STUDIES PARTICIPATION IN THE GENI GROWTH NETWORK INITIATIVE

This project is forging connections between faculty at the School of Arctic and Subarctic Studies (SASS) at Memorial University, community partners at Innu Parks, and scholars and community partners at other northern institutions, including, but not limited to, UiT The Arctic University of Norway, the University of Saskatchewan, and Yukon University. SASS faculty and their community partner are gaining first-hand experience in the co-development and co-delivery of landand place-based schools through this project and will participate in the co-creation and publication of comparative case studies, which will serve as relevant teaching materials for Northern and Indigenous study programs globally.

In summer 2023 Dr. Neilsen met with community partners at Innu Parks and confirmed their willingness to participate in this initiative. In September 2023, Dr. Neilsen and the Innu Parks Superintended and Lead Planner, Jack Penashue and Gioia Montevecchi, traveled to Whitehorse, Yukon, where they met with <u>GENI program</u> faculty, administrators, and students, and participated in the intensive five-day place-based course that the GENI program delivered there. This exposure provided an opportunity to learn about different ways-of-being and -doing in the North, and offered lessons that can inform ways-of-being and-doing in Labrador.

INDIGENOUS AND NORTHERN COLLABORATIVE RESEARCH AND EDUCATION FUND



FACILITATING CHILDREN'S VOICES IN STORYING THE LANDSCAPE OF CLIMATE CHANGE

The project, a collaboration between Memorial University, University of Lapland, and Leeds Beckett University aims to explore and celebrate the unique heritage and culture of diverse populations in the North. Focusing on children and youth, it addresses climate change's impact on local communities and emphasizes symbiotic relationships between living things. The initiative amplifies Northern youth voices on climate change and sustainability using a co-participatory and inclusive approach with social design principles. Adopting a 'radical collegiality' approach, the consortium plans live and digital exhibits across diverse Northern communities, fostering narratives, celebration, and comparison of climate-related initiatives. The innovative, social design approach promotes equitable, inclusive, and diverse public learning spaces.








THE CLIMATE COLLECTIVE

UNDER THE GLOBAL ARCTIC LEADERSHIP INITIATIVE FUND



As part of Memorial University's contribution agreement with Global Affairs for the Global Arctic Leadership Initiative, the Johnson Geo Centre's Climate Collective is a climate solution. collaboration network run through the Johnson Geo Centre. The Collective helps create and support Youth Climate Action chapters locally with youth in Newfoundland and Labrador and youth in the Arctic Circle. Creating connections between youth in these places will increase collaboration and awareness among northern communities. It will increase opportunities, capacity, and training for youth to develop and lead citizen science projects which tackle climate innovation challenges specific to their community/region, increase youth's connection to education and career pathways in STEAM-related disciplines, take part in the STEAM-based experiential education, and connect with other likeminded youth towards solutions focused climate awareness and education.





MEMORIAL UNIVERSITY'S COLLABORATIONS WITH NORWAY ON ARCTIC RESEARCH AND EDUCATION THROUGH UARCTIC

The projects featured below are just some of the many collaborations being highlighted by Memorial University's faculty and researchers.

HERITAGE MAKING IN THE ARCTIC

This is a research-led networking project that strengthens the Thematic Network CAFÉ (Circumpolar Archives, Folklore and Ethnography). The project sponsors meetings to elaborate the idea of "deep emplacement" in Arctic heritage making. Building on insights from indigenous philosophical traditions, and social theory, our network project brings together Arctic scholars and local indigenous practitioners to elaborate methods of self-reliance and to ground cultural heritage work by consulting with audio archives.

NETWORKING FOR INCREASING SUSTAINABILITY IN SNOW CRAB FISHERIES IN THE ARCTIC

The objective of this project is to increase collaboration and networking to address sustainability in Arctic resource exploitation and problems caused by lost fishing gear due to plastic materials used in snow crab pot fisheries in the Arctic. This will be addressed by a collaboration of four UArctic member institutions that have conducted research regarding the sustainability of fisheries in the Arctic, including the snow crab fishery. Snow crab is a commercially exploited species over cold-water areas in the Northern Hemisphere.







MEMORIAL UNIVERSITY'S COLLABORATIONS WITH NORWAY ON ARCTIC RESEARCH AND EDUCATION THROUGH UARCTIC (CONTINUED)

ARCTIC CONFERENCE ON EDUCATIONAL SCIENCES (ACCESS)

The overall goal of the project is to strengthen the wide network of educational researchers in the circumpolar North and to concentrate researcher community perspectives on UArctic, the Thematic Network on Teacher Education, and Arctic educational issues. This will be implemented by organizing an Arctic conference on educational sciences and publishing a series of video interviews, as the main activities of the project.

DIGITAL NORTH: GENI GROWTH NETWORKING INITIATIVE

This project is designed to broaden collaboration and mobility relevant to the joint master's program in Governance and Entrepreneurship in Northern and Indigenous Areas (GENI), a partnership between UiT The Arctic University of Norway, and the University of Saskatchewan. Through this Growth Networking Initiative, they are taking the first steps toward expanding the cooperation network to include Memorial University (Canada) and Umeå University (Sweden). Scholars at these universities have agreed to cooperate with the GENI partners in building an innovative pedagogical approach to our joint study program through the creation and incorporation of case studies from their respective regions.

2023 ACTIVITIES OF THEMATIC NETWORKS

NORTHERN AND ARCTIC ISLAND STUDIES RESEARCH:

- The first webinar was held on January 24, 2023, led by Dale Jarvis from Heritage Newfoundland.
- Yarns and Yarns Events (knitting and storytelling) was hosted on January 24, 2023, at St John's Public Library.
- The Northern & Arctic Islands Workshop was hosted at the Harris Centre on December 7-8, 2023, and had 35 participants from Shetland Islands, PEI, Faroe Islands, Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland, Canada.
- Published a report of activities by the network.

TEACHER EDUCATION FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE AND DIVERSITY IN EDUCATION

- Education, Equity and Inclusion Teaching and Learning for a Sustainable North publication. The book explores the provision of education across the North, focusing on challenges and innovations in meeting the needs of diverse learners in remote and rapidly changing contexts.
- Tuija Turunen gave a talk titled "It's not a miracle: Teacher preparation and teaching in Finland" on Wednesday, March 22, 2023 at the University of Alaska Anchorage. Dr. Tuija Turunen of the University of Lapland described Finland's approach to teacher education and working conditions and support for teachers in the classroom.







ARCTIC SAFETY AND SECURITY

- Master in Preparedness and Emergency
 Management is a part-time experienced-based
 master's degree programme. It aims to provide
 the candidates with substantial theoretical
 knowledge in preparedness and emergency
 management at both tactical, operational, and
 strategic levels, and to develop the leadership and
 critical thinking skills required to choose effective
 strategies, tools, and methods in emergency
 response operations.
- "Post Covid Tourism Back to Basics in Safety," featured speakers sharing their experience of developing safe and efficient Northern tourism.
- In connection with the seminar, Tourism Safety
 Training was held by LAPIN AMK in cooperation
 with other partners, aiming to give the key basic
 knowledge about safety in tourism to those
 involved in tourism activities, especially tourist
 quides.
- Short-term exchange program for students to increase motivation in their career development, and help our candidates to find an interesting research topic for their master thesis later on.

BLUE ECONOMY AND THE ARCTIC

- A side-event at High North Dialogue 2023 which was organized by High North Center for Business and Governance, Nord University, "Blue Economy and the Arctic" was held on April 18, 2023.
- A session was held at the UArctic at the 2023
 Arctic Circle Assembly titled, A blue economy agenda for the Arctic? Perspectives on justice, diversity and inclusion and took place on October 21, 2023.



NORTH2NORTH STUDENT AND STAFF EXCHANGES

As one of UArctic's signature programs, north2north provides exchange opportunities to collaborate and study in participating institutions across the circumpolar North. For Canadian students and staff, there are two sources of funding:

1. The Northern Canadian north2north funding, administered through Yukon University is available for students and staff/faculty at participating north2north member institutions in Canada with a priority to support those who are living in or from Canada's Arctic and Northern regions (YT, NT, NU, Labrador), and/or studying/researching/teaching subjects relevant to Arctic, Indigenous or Northern Circumpolar subjects. Exchanges can take place between participating north2north institutions in the USA, Iceland, Greenland, Denmark, Finland, Norway, and Sweden. Exchanges between or to the territories of Canada may be supported as well. Applications are open with a deadline to apply by February 15, 2024. There are typically two application rounds annually, the main round is held in February each year, with an additional round in September (dependent on funding availability).
