




Challenges facing Labrador West

- Need for economic diversification




K-12 Enrolment, Zone 2 2000-01 to 2005-06




The role of universities in regional development

- Universities are a resource which is available to the entire community.






The Labrador Institute

Scope of Activities

- Approximately 40 projects identified in Labrador West
 - 18 fall under the 'Environment and Natural Resources' category
 - 10 fall under the 'Social and Cultural Development' category
 - 12 fall under the 'Labour Markets' category
- 452 Memorial alumni in the region



Environment and Natural Resources – Derek Wilton

- Studies mineral deposits, particularly in Labrador
- Associated with the Labrador Institute as research Coordinator
- Co-Investigator with the INCO Innovation Centre (IIC)
- Involved with the Coasts Under Stress project studying mining history and development of small scale projects based on gemstones
- Fall of 2006 visited all communities with High Schools in Labrador; providing an overview on geology to the students; held community meetings on research

- The Labrador West Music Festival nurtures a friendly, non-competitive atmosphere where amateur musicians of all ages can enjoy performing and hearing others perform.



Social and Cultural Development – Scott Neilsen

- Uncovering the 3000+ year old history of mining in the Ashuanipi Lake region where Innu ancestors collected rock for stone tools
- Shedding light on culture/history of a littlestudied region
- Over 20 sites have been identified for study

The One-page process...the how...

- Follow-up meeting with stakeholders to define the process, develop one-pagers;
- Community champions identified;
- One-pagers filled in, sent to KM Manager;
- Brokerage begins; projects molded;
- Key: evolving process, but things happen!
- Must be patient and communicate!




The How...

- Projects divided into:
 - Green Light
 - Yellow Light
 - Red Light
- Depending on champions projects can shift;
- 70+<u>projects</u> so always changing stages, with potentially 130+ projects in one month.
