

Zone 20 Population 2001-06








K-12 Enrolment, Zone 20

The Role of Universities in Regional Development




- Universities produce highly-skilled workers.

Undergraduate and Graduate Enrolment Full- and Part-time, 1949-2006 (End of regular registration period)





- Facilitates and coordinates the activity of personnel at the University as they undertake cultural, research and educational activities.






