

ROYAL SOCIETY OF CANADA'S COLLEGE OF NEW SCHOLARS, ARTISTS AND SCIENTISTS



Dr. Eric Tenkorang, associate professor, Department of Sociology, and Dr. Josh Lepawsky, professor, Department of Geography, are among 2020's inductees to the Royal Society of Canada's College of New Scholars, Artists and Scientists. Dr. Tenkorang is widely recognized for his trailblazing research focused on HIV/AIDS and gender-based violence. His research highlights the vulnerability of marginalized populations to HIV risks and violence in sub-Saharan Africa.

CANADIAN ACADEMY OF HEALTH SCIENCES



Dr. Michael Grant is among the newest Fellows of the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences (CAHS). Dr. Grant, who is the associate dean of the Division of Biomedical Sciences and a professor of immunology, started his career as the only biomedical scientist in Atlantic Canada studying HIV. His innovative interdisciplinary work significantly influenced understanding of

immunology and infectious disease and helped put Canadian HIV research on the map. (More here)

RSC URSULA FRANKLIN AWARD IN GENDER STUDIES



Dr. Sonja Boon, professor and graduate co-ordinator, Department of Gender Studies, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, is the 2020 recipient of the Ursula Franklin Award in Gender Studies. Dr. Boon is the university's first recipient of this prestigious honour from the Royal Society of Canada (RSC). The award, presented biennially by the RSC, recognizes outstanding contributions to furthering the understanding of issues

concerning gender. Dr. Boon researches in the areas of feminist theory, life writing, autoethnography and women's history. She is globally lauded for her methodological innovations and theoretical contributions in her field of study. (More here)
