Tenure Track:

The tenure-track positions listed below will normally commence July 1, 2019, subject to budgetary approval, and will be made at the rank of Assistant Professor. The positions normally require a completed doctoral degree in the appropriate discipline. A completed earned doctorate (or recognized terminal qualification in the discipline) is required for the appointee to receive the rank of Assistant Professor and to be in a tenure-track position. (If a successful candidate has not completed an earned doctorate, he/she shall be appointed to a regular term, non-renewable three-year appointment. If the candidate completes all the requirements for the doctorate during the first 24 months of the term appointment, he/she shall begin a tenure-track appointment following completion of the requirements of the degree.) The Department of English, which administers the Major in Communication Studies program, invites applications for a tenure-track position at the Assistant Professor level to commence July 1, 2019. The central areas of specialization are Communication Studies and Creativity, and the successful candidate will take an active role in growing the interdisciplinary Major in Communication Studies and in developing a graduate program in Communication Studies. Strong candidates will have teaching specialization and an active research program in the Digital Humanities (DH) and new media. Ideally, the candidate will also be able to contribute to our Creative Writing programs by teaching courses in new media creation.

Our department understands Digital Humanities and new media to include but not be limited to digital storytelling, digital activism, multimedia installation, social media, digital exhibition and archives, podcasting, photography, sound, and geographical information systems [GIS]. The Department of Modern Languages, Literatures and Cultures invites applications for a **tenure track position in Quebec Studies, with a sub-specialty in French language minorities in Canada.**

The Department of Modern Languages, Literatures and Cultures currently offers an undergraduate Major and Minor in French as well as a Master in French Studies and a Master of Arts and Education offered jointly with the Faculty of Education. In addition to interdisciplinary collaboration among colleagues in Arts and Education, the Department also has connections with community organizations.

The position requires a completed doctoral degree in Quebec Studies. A completed earned doctorate (or recognized terminal qualification in the discipline) is required for the appointee to receive the rank of Assistant Professor and to be in a tenure-track position. If a successful candidate has not completed an earned doctorate, he/she shall be appointed to a regular term, non-renewable three-year appointment. The applicant must demonstrate research interest in French language minorities in Canada, with experience in teaching and research; ability to teach undergraduate courses in French language, literatures and cultures at all levels, and to supervise graduate students. Candidates must have a native or near-native fluency in French, as well as a strong command of oral and written English.

The Department of Political Science seeks to fill a tenure-track position. The successful candidate will have a Ph.D. (or be close to completion) and a well-developed program of research in politics, policy and law.

The candidate will have a Ph.D. in Political Science (or related field), with preference for a sub-field specialization in public policy, Canadian politics, or political theory. In addition to teaching in the Department of Political Science, the candidate will be expected to contribute at least one course each year to the department's undergraduate Law and Society Program. The candidate must also possess substantive research interests in the area of "politics, policy and law", broadly defined. Candidates will be assessed based on their ability to carry out an independent research program that yields significant peer-reviewed publications, to compete successfully for external funding to support this research program, and to engage in effective teaching and supervision of graduate students.
