

Tri-Council Scholarships & Grants

1. CANADA GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS — MICHAEL SMITH FOREIGN STUDY SUPPLEMENTS

Internal SASS Deadlines: May 8 and August 5 External Deadline: May 25 and September 11 Amount: Up to \$6,000 for international travel

Description: The Canada Graduate Scholarships – Michael Smith Foreign Study Supplements (CGS-MSFSS) support high-caliber Canadian graduate students in building global linkages and international networks through the pursuit of exceptional research experiences at research institutions abroad. By accessing international scientific research and training, CGS-MSFSS recipients will contribute to strengthening the potential for collaboration between Canadian and foreign institutions.

Eligibility: To be eligible to apply for this supplement, you must: (a) have accepted or currently hold a CGS (master's or doctoral) or eligible Vanier CGS; (b) undertake your proposed trip abroad no earlier than the competition deadline date; and, (c) not hold, or have held, any other CGS-MSFSS during the course of your graduate studies. To remain eligible during the research study period abroad, you must; (a) hold an active CGS at the time your research study period abroad starts; (b) be registered in a graduate research studies program at a Canadian institution for the duration of your research study period abroad; (c) take up the award within one year of receiving the notice of award for the CGS-MSFSS; and, (c) return to complete your degree at your Canadian institution.

2. TRI-COUNCIL CANADA GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS — DOCTORAL

Internal SASS Deadline: September 15

External Deadline: October 5

Amount: \$21,000 - 35,000 for 3 years

Description: The CGS-D program supports and promotes research excellence in a wide variety of disciplines and broad fields of health, natural sciences and engineering, and social sciences and humanities, including interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary research. This support allows scholars to fully concentrate on their doctoral studies, to seek out the best research mentors in their chosen fields and to contribute to the Canadian research ecosystem during and beyond the tenure of their awards.

Eligibility: To be eligible to apply, you must; be a Canadian citizen, a permanent resident of Canada or a Protected Person under subsection 95(2) of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act (Canada), as of the application deadline; have completed *no more than 24 months* of full-time study in your doctoral program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if previously enrolled in a graduate program; have completed *no more than 36 months* of full-time study in your joint program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if enrolled in a joint program; such as, MD/PhD, MA/PhD; if you fall into this category, you have access to the 36-month window whether or not you were previously enrolled in a master's program; have completed *no more than 36 months* of full-time study in your doctoral program by December 31 of the calendar year of application if enrolled directly from a bachelor's to a PhD program (without having completed or enrolled in another graduate program); direct-entry applicants must be enrolled in their doctoral program at the time of application.

3. TRI-COUNCIL CANADA GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS — MASTER'S

Internal SASS Deadline: November 12

External Deadline: December 1 Amount: \$17,500 for 1 year

Description: The CGS-M program provides financial support to high-caliber scholars who are engaged in an eligible master's or, in some cases, doctoral program in Canada (refer to <u>Eligibility</u> for more information). This support allows these scholars to fully concentrate on their studies in their chosen fields. The CGS-M program supports up to 3,000 students annually in all disciplines and is administered jointly by Canada's three granting agencies: the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC), and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC). The selection process and post-award administration are carried out at the institutional level, under the guidance of the three agencies.

Eligibility: To be eligible to apply, you must; be a Canadian citizen, a permanent resident of Canada or a Protected Person under subsection 95(2) of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act (Canada) as of the application deadline date; be enrolled in, have applied for or will apply for full-time admission* to an eligible graduate program at the master's or doctoral level at a Canadian institution with a CGS M allocation; respect the internal deadline to apply for admission for your intended program of study—contact the faculty of graduate studies (or its equivalent) at the selected Canadian institution(s) for more detailed information; have completed, as of December 31 of the year of application; either between 0 and 12 months of fulltime studies (or full-time equivalent) in the program for which you are requesting funding, or between 4 and 12 months of full-time study (or full-time equivalent) in an eligible master's program for which the degree requirements will be completed before activation of the award, allowing it to be activated during the first 12 months of the subsequent doctoral program for which you are requesting funding; not have held or be currently holding a CGS M scholarship from CIHR, NSERC or SSHRC; have achieved a first-class average**, as determined by the host institution, in each of the last two completed years of study (full-time equivalent); submit a maximum of one scholarship (master's or doctoral) or fellowship application per academic year to either CIHR, NSERC or SSHRC.

Scholarships & Grants for Northern Research

4. NORTHERN SCIENTIFIC TRAINING PROGRAM

Internal SASS Deadline: September 15

External Deadline: October 5

Amount: Up to \$6,000

Description: The Northern Scientific Training Program (NSTP) is administered by Polar Knowledge Canada (POLAR). It was established in 1961 to encourage Canadian universities to participate in training Northern specialists to meet national needs.

Eligibility: Be enrolled in a degree program at a Canadian university. NSTP will provide one year of funding for thesis-based research at the undergraduate level, up to two years of funding for thesis-based research at the Masters level and up to three years of funding for thesis-based research at the doctoral level. Students supported by training funds must be Canadian citizens or permanent residents. Summer and winter projects are eligible. Post-doctoral studies are not supported.

5. NORTHERN RESIDENT AWARD AND SCHOLARSHIPS — ASSOCIATION OF CANADIAN UNIVERSITIES FOR NORTHERN STUDIES

Internal SASS Deadline: Two business weeks prior to submission

External Deadline: October 30 - January 31

Amount: Varies

Description: ACUNS established its scholarship program, the Canadian Northern Studies Trust (CNST) in 1982 to advance knowledge and understanding of Northern Canada. The purpose of the CNST is to develop a cadre of scholars and scientists with Northern experience and, at the same time, to enhance the educational opportunities available for Northern residents. The funds administered by the CNST come from a variety of donors committed to Northern research. Look here for more information on our current donors or how to contribute to the CNST.

6. WESTON FAMILY AWARDS IN NORTHERN RESEARCH — MASTER'S

Internal SASS Deadline: January 5 External Deadline: January 19 Amount: \$20,000 for 1 year

Description: Since 2007, the Weston Family Awards in Northern Research have provided unparalleled support to early-career scientists in Canada pursuing research in Canada's North. Funded by the Weston Family Foundation, these annual awards are some of the most prestigious in the country for students pursuing a master's degree, a doctoral degree or postdoctoral fellowship. Nearly 300 students have been selected to receive an award since the program's inception, forming a community of Weston Family Northern Scientists who are at the forefront of Northern scholarship and who are helping shape a better future for Canada and the world. Weston Family Award winners undertake research projects across a broad spectrum of fields and disciplines in the natural sciences, including studies of Northern ecosystems, biodiversity, flora and fauna, meteorology, oceanography, glaciology, geography and environmental studies.

Eligibility: Applicants to the master's level of the awards program must: 1) Be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident of Canada as of the application deadline; 2) Be enrolled in a master's program (leading to a thesis) in the natural sciences pursuing Northern research at an accredited Canadian university as of the application deadline; 3) Have received approval for their research proposal, including any required ethical reviews and/or research licenses, by the time they start their award.

7. WESTON FAMILY AWARDS IN NORTHERN RESEARCH — DOCTORAL

Internal SASS Deadline: January 5 External Deadline: January 19 Amount: \$120,000 over 3 years

Description: Since 2007, the Weston Family Foundation, through its Weston Family Awards in Northern Research program, has provided unparalleled support to early-career scientists undertaking research in Northern Canada. Their research spans a broad spectrum of fields and disciplines in the natural sciences and is addressing key knowledge gaps in our understanding of Northern biodiversity. Since the awards program's inception, nearly 300 earlycareer scientists have been supported resulting in a community of Weston Family Northern Scientists at the forefront of Northern scholarship, all of whom share a passion for Arctic and Northern research and all of whom are helping to create a better future for Canada and for the world. The awards are some of the largest in the country for students pursuing a master's degree, doctoral degree, or postdoctoral fellowship. The awards program supports an "Extended Stay" program that enables master's and doctoral level students to apply for additional funding to engage with Northerners (including Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities and community members), disseminate the results of their field research, and maximize the impact of their work. The awards program also supports "Travel Allowances" for postdoctoral fellows that allow them to perform research in the North and attend conferences.

Eligibility: Applicants to the doctoral level of the awards program must: 1) Be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident of Canada as of the application deadline; 2) Be enrolled in a doctoral program (leading to a thesis) in the natural sciences pursuing Northern research at an accredited Canadian university as of the application deadline; 3) Have received approval for their research proposal, including any required ethical reviews and/or research licenses, by the time they start their award. Please note that past recipients of the Weston Family Awards in Northern Research at the master's level are eligible to apply for an award at the doctoral level.

8. JENNIFER ROBINSON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP — ARCTIC INSTITUTE OF NORTH AMERICA

Internal SASS Deadline: January 5

External Deadline: January 20

Amount: \$5,000

Description: The Jennifer Robinson Memorial Scholarship is awarded to a graduate student in Northern biology who best exemplifies the qualities of scholarship that the late Jennifer Robinson brought to her studies at the Institute's Kluane Lake Research Station. The scholarship committee looks for evidence of Northern relevance, and a commitment to field-oriented research.

9. CNST SCHOLARSHIP (FUNDED BY ACUNS)

Internal SASS Deadline: January 11 External Deadline: January 30 Amount: \$10,000 for 1 year

Description: Proposals are invited from candidates from all subject areas including interdisciplinary and comparative studies who: (a) engage in research culminating in a thesis or other such document; (b) include direct Northern field research or experience as part of their studies; and (c) whose programs are relevant to Northern challenges or issues.

Eligibility: You must: be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident; be enrolled full-time in college or university at the time of application AND over the tenure of the award; not concurrently hold two ACUNS awards, but you may hold other awards and financial support while holding an ACUNS award; include a Northern fieldwork component in your research that is conducted between May (in the year you receive your award) and the following March or May (depending on specific award). Conduct your research project in the North as defined on the *Northern Boundary Map*.

10. DR. JIM MCDONALD SCHOLARSHIP FOR NORTHERN RESEARCH

Internal SASS Deadline: January 11 External Deadline: January 30

Amount: \$5,000 once

Description: The Association of Canadian Universities for Northern Research (ACUNS), with the support of the family of the late Dr. Jim McDonald, is sponsoring one scholarship valued at \$5,000 for Canadian citizens or permanent residents of Canada currently enrolled in graduate studies in the social sciences and humanities as these pertain to Northern Canada and its inhabitants. Community-based research, interdisciplinary research and local Indigenous collaboration will be given special consideration, as will those that can demonstrate a specific focus to their project. Proposals are invited from candidates working in the social sciences and humanities who: (a) engage in research culminating in a thesis or other such document; (b) whose program makes a contribution to the North; and, (c) who demonstrate leadership in Northern scholarship. The research project must involve a Northern fieldwork component that is conducted in Northern Canada or the circumpolar North between May of the year the scholarship is granted and the following March.

Eligibility: You must: be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident; be enrolled full-time in college or university at the time of application AND over the tenure of the award; not concurrently hold two ACUNS awards, but you may hold other awards and financial support while holding an ACUNS award. You must include a Northern fieldwork component in your research that is conducted between May (in the year you receive your award) and the following March or May (depending on specific award); and conduct your research project in the North as defined on the *Northern Boundary Map*.

11. DR. WESTON BLAKE JR. MEMORIAL DOCTORAL SCHOLARSHIP

Internal SASS Deadline: January 11 External Deadline: January 30 Amount: \$10,000 for 1 year

Description: Dr. Blake was a quaternary geologist who spent over 50 Arctic seasons in Canada, Greenland, and Svalbard, beginning in 1952. Throughout his career, spent almost entirely at the Geological Survey of Canada, he encouraged students to join in field expeditions, and often worked with interdisciplinary teams. ACUNS offers one scholarship valued at \$10,000 available to students who are citizens or permanent residents of Canada presently enrolled in a doctoral program at a Canadian university. Proposals are invited from candidates studying the physical sciences including interdisciplinary and comparative studies who: (a) engage in research culminating in a thesis or other such document; (b) include direct Northern field research or experience as part of their studies; and (c) whose programs are relevant to Northern challenges or issues.

Eligibility: You must: (a) be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident; (b) be enrolled full-time in college or university at the time of application AND over the tenure of the award; (c) not concurrently hold two ACUNS awards, but you may hold other awards and financial support while holding an ACUNS award; (d) include a Northern fieldwork component in your research that is conducted between May (in the year you receive your award) and the following March or May (depending on specific award); and (e) conduct your research project in the North as defined on the *Northern Boundary Map*.

12. KAY AND PETER MCGEER SCHOLARSHIP FOR NORTHERN RESEARCH

Internal SASS Deadline: January 11

External Deadline: January 30

Amount: \$3,000 once

Description: The Association of Canadian Universities for Northern Studies (ACUNS), with the support of the family of the late Kay and Peter McGeer, is sponsoring one scholarship valued at \$3,000 for Canadian citizens or permanent residents of Canada currently enrolled in graduate studies at a Canadian University. Proposals are invited from candidates working in all subject areas including interdisciplinary and comparative studies who: (a) are engaged in research culminating in a thesis or other such document; (b) whose program makes a contribution to the North; and, (c) who are working to establish meaningful relationships with local communities based on knowledge sharing. The proposed research project must include fieldwork that is conducted in Northern Canada or the circumpolar North (see *Northern Boundary line*) between May of the year the scholarship is granted and the following March.

Eligibility: You must: (a) be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident; be enrolled full-time in college or university at the time of application AND over the tenure of the award; (b) not concurrently hold two ACUNS awards, but you may hold other awards and financial support while holding an ACUNS award; (c) include a Northern fieldwork component in your research that is conducted between May (in the year you receive your award) and the following March or May (depending on specific award); and, (d) conduct your research project in the North as defined on the <u>Northern Boundary Map</u>.

13. JIM BOURQUE SCHOLARSHIP — ARCTIC INSTITUTE OF NORTH AMERICA

Internal SASS Deadline: June 18

External Deadline: July 8

Amount: \$1,000

Description: The Jim Bourque Scholarship is awarded to a Canadian Aboriginal student who is enrolled in post-secondary training in education, environmental studies, traditional knowledge or telecommunications, and is a Canadian Aboriginal student. To apply, you must submit: a cover letter, a 500-word essay (describing your intended program of study and the reasons you chose the program), transcripts, signed letter of recommendation from a community leader, statement of financial need, proof of enrollment in or application to a post-secondary institution, and proof of Canadian Aboriginal descent.

14. NATURAL SCIENCES AND ENGINEERING RESEARCH COUNCIL OF CANADA (NSERC) INDIGENOUS STUDENT AMBASSADORS (PREVIOUSLY AANSE)

Internal SASS Deadline: Three to seven months before beginning proposed activity

External Deadline: Two months before beginning proposed activity Amount: Up to \$5,000

Description: The NSERC Indigenous Student Ambassadors (NISA) grant aims to engage Indigenous students and fellows in promoting interest and participation in the natural sciences and engineering (NSE) by visiting Canada's Indigenous communities and schools and sharing their research and education experiences or participating in science promotion events and activities. The value of the grant will be based on the budget proposed in your application. You may hold only one NISA grant per fiscal year (April 1 to March 31).

Eligibility: You must be an Indigenous person in Canada and registered at a Canadian postsecondary institution, polytechnic, college or CEGEP in the NSE or have been registered last term and plan to return next term to one of those institutions for studies in the NSE or be a postdoctoral fellow in the NSE at a Canadian postsecondary institution.

15. INDSPIRE — BUILDING BRIGHTER FUTURES (FORMERLY NAAF)

Internal SASS Deadline: N/A

External Deadlines: November 1, February 1, and August 1

Amount: Varies

Description: Indspire has evolved into the largest non-governmental funding body for First Nations, Inuit, and Métis post-secondary students across Canada. Bursary and scholarship awards are provided to First Nations, Inuit, and Métis students annually across a diverse range of disciplines. There is one application for all of Indspire's bursaries, scholarships, and awards (with a few exceptions that you'll see below). You only need to complete the application once to be considered for all applicable bursaries, scholarships, and awards.

16. INDIGENOUS SCHOLARS AWARDS AND SUPPLEMENTS PILOT INITIATIVE

Internal SASS Deadline: November 13

External Deadline: November 28

Amount: Supplement \$5,000 for 1 year; Award \$17,500 for 1 year

Description: The Indigenous Scholars Awards and Supplements Pilot Initiative will provide financial support to meritorious Indigenous students who have applied to the Canada Graduate Scholars — Master's program (CGS-M).

Eligibility: Applicants must: (a) be eligible to apply to the CGS-M program; (b) self-identify as Indigenous for the purposes of this initiative; provide a one-page (3,000 characters maximum) personal statement; and, (c) have had their application deemed meritorious in the CGS-M review process. Meritorious applications include all applications that have received the status "Offered" or "Alternate" in the Research Portal (see selection process for the CGS-M program for more information).

17. RBC FUTURE LAUNCH SCHOLARSHIP FOR INDIGENOUS YOUTH

Internal SASS Deadline: January 17

External Deadline: February 7

Amount: Up to \$10,000 for up to 4 years

Description: The RBC Future Launch Scholarship for Indigenous Youth will award 20 scholarships annually valued up to \$10,000 each per year (up to 4 years) to First Nations, Inuit and Métis students across Canada demonstrating strong academic performance and community involvement. RBC has been providing a scholarship for Indigenous students to complete post-secondary education since 1992. To date, more than \$1.9 million dollars have been awarded to 218 Indigenous youth across Canada pursuing post-secondary education.

Eligibility: Students must be Status Indian*, Non-Status Indian, Inuit or Métis. Students also must: (a) be a permanent resident or citizen of Canada; (b) have applied or are currently attending an accredited post-secondary institution in Canada; (c) maintain a full course load that leads to a recognized degree, certificate or diploma; (d) have shown strong potential to successfully complete the post-secondary program; (e) require financial assistance to pursue their education; (f) not be an RBC employee or a dependent of an RBC employee; and, (g) be between the ages of 15-29 at the time of application.

18. LORETTA SAUNDERS COMMUNITY SCHOLARSHIP

Internal SASS Deadline: July 15

External Deadline: July 30

Amount: \$500 - \$2,000

Description: The Loretta Saunders Community Scholarship Fund is available for Indigenous women who are attending a post-secondary institution in Mi'kma'ki, Nunatsiavut, or Atlantic Canada and who have completed the equivalent of one year of post-secondary education in the previous two years.

19. WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION OF MEMORIAL UNIVERSITY OF NEWFOUNDLAND GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP

Internal SASS Deadline: October 25
External Deadline: November 14

Amount: \$1,200

Description and Eligibility: Awarded annually to two full-time masters and two full-time doctoral students who are in their first year of their program at time of application. For the master's level, one shall be awarded for a thesis-based program and one for a course-based program. Financial need as well as scholarship standing will be taken into consideration.

20. KAPPA KAPPA GAMMA FOUNDATION OF CANADA SCHOLARSHIP FOR CANADIAN WOMEN

Internal SASS Deadline: March 15

External Deadline: March 31

Amount: \$2,500

Description: The Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation of Canada supports Canadian women who attain the high standards of scholarship, leadership and service to their community to which our Fraternity is committed. Each year, we use the donations we receive from our committed supporters to award scholarships to Canadian women pursuing higher education.

Eligibility: Any female Canadian citizen currently enrolled in and pursuing a Ph.D. program is eligible to apply. Permanent Residents are NOT eligible for this award. You do not have to be a member of the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation of Canada to apply. You also do not have to be a member of the Kappa Kappa Gamma Fraternity to apply.

21. DR. URSULA A. KELLY LABRADOR GRADUATE RESEARCH AWARD

Internal SASS Deadline: Two business weeks prior to submission

External Deadline: No set date

Amount: Varies
