# Message From the Program Director

Hello Everyone,

Well, it has another eventful year and I'm sure that many are hoping for a less eventful 2022! While there have been challenges, there has also been continued growth and excellence in our program.

Firstly, we said goodbye to our senior residents in June and hello to a group of new FRCPC colleagues. Dr. Stuart Gill is busy in Waterford's outpatient department and Community Care. Dr. Angelique Myles can be found at the Miller Centre geriatric department and Dr. Kevin Fowler has opened a private practice in the community. Dr. Gabrielle Lapointe has relocated to New Brunswick. Dr. Christopher Earle and Dr. Melanie Wong have pursued ongoing fellowship training in Sleep Medicine and Geriatric Psychiatry, respectively.

On the other side of the residency program, we welcomed Dr. Violet Campbell, Dr. Dakotah Janes, Dr. Michael Gilbert, Dr. Eva Davenport and Dr. Deborah Dawson as PGY1's. They have been steadily gaining competencies in PAU and the SSU, as well as Addiction Medicine and consolidating general medical knowledge. We were very excited this year to enhance their primary care exposure, particularly focused on underserviced populations, with clinics at Choices for Youth and the Downtown Collaborative Clinic. Similarly, the Addiction rotation locally has been enhanced by accompanying nursing colleagues in harm reduction clinics and visits to shelters in St. John's. It is the program's goal to foster an early appreciation for the importance of advocacy and collaboration in our clinical work.

Competence by Design continues to roll out for junior residents and our first cohort is reaching the end of the Foundations stage of training. A huge thank you to staff who have downloaded and implemented MUNCAT evaluations, participated in faculty development or served as academic advisors and to our junior residents who have helped prompt faculty along the way. Our hope in 2022 is to have all psychiatry faculty participating in evaluations and coaching, both in clinical rotations and on call.

The pandemic has continued to introduce challenges for clinical work and academic activities. Residents and faculty have met these challenges collaboratively with creative and flexible solutions. I am proud of our province and equally proud of our Discipline. I would also like to acknowledge the work of our co-administrative residents Dr. Dave Lundrigan and Dr. Sara Dalley, who have been tasked with managing the call schedule during a COVID wave, while preparing for Royal College examinations.

Taking direction from the Royal College, our Discipline has enhanced its curriculum in Quality Assurance and Patient Safety. Junior residents completed a new module focused on these topics in the Fall of 2021. Our Faculty Resident Retreat reviewed the importance of handover and explored how we might implement a standardized approach in clinical work.

The Faculty-Resident Retreat was also noteworthy in that it allowed us to meet in person and reacquaint ourselves, or meet junior residents for the first time! I think that was important for our collective wellness and I hope that we can return to at least a hybrid approach sometime soon. In the interim, please do introduce yourselves to any unfamiliar faces and stay well.
