The award honors Dr. Cecil Couves, a Professor of the Discipline of Surgery at Memorial University who was appointed to the Medical Research Council of Canada in 1977. Dr. Couves was Chair of the Discipline of Surgery from 1974 to 1979.


AROUND TOWN IN THE FALL

DECEMBER, 1933. Saturday 9 (343-22) Ossisted at essenior of cyst of pomis; Laparotomy for Circhons of Lives; Hermia; + removal of ovarian Cyst i girl g 21. It weight 6 lbs. fraished up at2 45. Down town root some 1 mas cards + for a walk. Don andrews son to see me before tea - timed up a few maps tonight. To bed at 11 read until 1145,

Saturday, December 9, 1933 – A General Surgery Case

"Assisted at incision of cyst of penis; laparotomy for cirrhosis of liver; hernia and removal of ovarian cyst in girl of 21. It weighed 6 lbs. Finished up at 245. Down town and got some Xmas cards and for a walk. Don Andrews in to see me before tea. Fixed up a few maps tonight. To bed at 11 and read until 1145."

Tuesday, December 12, 1933 – An Orthopaedic Surgery Case

"Assisted at hernia and laparotomy for Tb. Did some reading this afternoon. Card letter from Auntie Alice Rusted. Tonight sewed up accident case, cut with axe, the head of 1st metatarsal was cut off and 1st phalanx split few tendons cut, took me an hour to finish the job."

DECEMBER, 1933. Tuesday 12 (346-19) Assisted at hermia laperstomy for Th. Did some reading this afternoon. Card lette from Auntre Alice Rusted. Tonight sewed up accident case, cut is asse, the head of it metalarsal set pt was cut of sew tendons cut, took me an hour to finish the jit.

HIGHLIGHTING RESEARCH IN UROLOGY

Faculty and learners from the university have had some incredible urological research presented at conferences all over and published in various peer-reviewed journals.




Fig. 2. Photographs of series of 3D-printed testicular cancer models. (A) Represents all five of the series of testicular cancer models. Scrotums depicted contain either, two healthy testicles, or a healthy testicle and a testicle containing an endophytic lesion of varying size. (B) Represents one of the testicular cancer models with stand for easy palpation. (C) Represents the testes from the testicular cancer model. Malignancies are endophytic and cannot be distinguished visually.

An exceptional team of faculty and medical students from the university developed incredible 3D printed testicular cancer models. They serve to facilitate teaching testicular examination and improving understanding of testicular malignancies among patients and medical learners. The paper and poster presentations associated with the model have been presented across the country and published in the *Canadian Urological Association Journal*.


