Is the statement 100% accurate?


Double Negatives	Overly Complex or	Absolute	"Sometimes"

Double Negatives: True or False Questions

"It is not true that Newfoundland is not East of Toronto"

Two negatives

- Can you eliminate the pair?
- What remains?




Overly Complex & Run On: True or False Questions

"Newfoundland and Labrador is the most Eastern point of Canada, joined Canada in 1949, has a time zone 60 minutes ahead of PEI, and houses the L'Anse aux Meadows Viking colony"

Info-filled or hiding a false statement?

- Pace your reading
- Agree with individual facts?
- Is it all 100% true?




Absolute Statements: True or False Questions

"All Newfoundland dogs have only black fur"

Statement is an ultimatum

- Must be 100% true
- No exceptions




"Sometimes" Statements: True or False Questions

"there are often puffins to see in Elliston, NL in the Summer"

Statement is making an assumption

- Allows for exceptions
- Allows for discretion
- "sometimes", "most of the time",
 "often", or "frequently"
