

Background

Approximately 38 million are living with HIV, and 1.8 million were newly infected with HIV (UNAIDS, 2021)

Globally, 180, 000 children under 15 years old acquired HIV every day and more than 90% of them were due to MTCT of HIV (Henry J Kaiser Family Foundation, 2021)

90% of MTCT of HIV occurred in sub-Saharan Africa (UNAIDS, 2021)

In Rwanda, 5300 people of all ages were newly infected in 2021 (UNAIDS, 2021; WHO, 2020).

At University Teaching Hospital of Butare in the PMTCT program, the number of HIV+ children was 158 in 2018, the time I started my PhD (CHUB Report, 2018)

Mother to child transmission


 Mothers with HIV can transmit virus to their infants during pregnancy, childbirth and breast feeding.

Describe how the PMTCT program can be implemented effectively.




Jemographic characteristics

Emerging Themes



Discussion

- The discussion chapter was very challenging to write because most of the concepts are interconnected
- > HIV+ women's adherence to the PMTCT program is a complex phenomenon
- Understanding the intersectionality between health-related multilevel factors and other forms of social marginalization provided a richer and more comprehensive picture of the experiences of HIV+ women
- The larger conceptual pieces in my findings are patriarchy, gender roles and norms, cultural ideology, power relationships, and systems of domination and oppression
