

We accept responsibility for achieving common goals and objectives.



Message from the Dean

s we reflect on the 2021–2022 year, there is great deal for the School of Pharmacy to celebrate. In the fall of 2021, we began this celebration with our Scholarships & Awards ceremony. We are very thankful to all the alumni and donors that make this event possible and provide much needed support for our students. In turn, we also like to celebrate our alumni with Janice Audeau receiving our Alumni Achievement Award. Dr. Audeau is a double alumnus of Memorial's School of Pharmacy, graduating from our Working Professional PharmD program in 2022. Yet somehow, in her role with the Pharmacist Association of Newfoundland and Labrador (PANL), Janice still found time to be everywhere during the pandemic and has truly been a leading voice for pharmacy.

Pharmacy has been forever changed by the pandemic. Our Medication Therapy Services Clinic was right in the middle of it all giving Covid vaccinations, but also adapting their processes to allow remote delivery. As we inch back to the new "normal", the MTS clinic, the School of Pharmacy and the profession are all trying to pick through the good and the bad and try to retain the practices that help the profession to move forward. On the teaching front, there were some major milestones reached this year. We were very pleased to move from provisional to full accreditation status with the Canadian Council for Accreditation of Pharmacy Programs (CCAPP) in June 2022 for a five-year term ending in June 2027. Also in June, after a year with no graduates, we—and the whole profession—were delighted to celebrate the first graduation of the first entry-level PharmD class.

In research, there was much to celebrate on multiple fronts. Dr. Hai Nguyen spent time at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health after winning a Fulbright Research Scholarship.

Dr. Lee coordinated Newfoundland's participation in World Hypertension Day by checking the blood pressure of over 500 patients in collaboration with community pharmacies across the province. (That reminds me, I really should get my blood pressure checked.)

The Cannabis Health Evaluation and Research Partnership (CHERP) group, coordinated by Drs. Bishop and Donnan, continues to engage in high profile public events directed at safe and informed cannabis use. Our students have also had great success.

Bridges, a PhD student, has fittingly built a bridge to entrepreneurship with a project involving computerized assessment of Parkinson's disease. After winning the Memorial Mel Woodard Cup for this work, she went on to place second in the Global Student Entrepreneur Awards (GSEA) National Championships. Her partnership with Gordon Genge and the formation of their company (PharmClin) has moved her PhD project out of the lab and it has the potential to revolutionize the assessment of Parkinson's therapy.

Olivia Perry was also successful in taking her research poster, first presented at the School of Pharmacy Research Day, on to the national CSPS conference and winning the undergraduate poster award.

So much accomplished and so much more to do—both for the school and the profession. But it is good to take a moment to look back, to celebrate, take a breath and then get back at it.

Cannabis Crossroads: Growing Knowledge and Weeding Out Misinformation

The Cannabis Health Evaluation and Research Partnership (CHERP) held a <u>series of webinars</u> on October 6 and 20, and on November 3 and 17.

CHERP is a research group whose primary goal is to determine how cannabis legalization has affected health and public safety in Newfoundland and Labrador.

The webinar series was developed to share knowledge and create conversations around safe cannabis use and was in response to extensive public consultation that suggested a need for public education on cannabis related issues. The series consisted of four biweekly webinars with panels of experts answering questions and discussing different topics related to cannabis. One of these webinars was a continuing education session for health care professionals where there were discusions on issues surrounding medical cannabis and harm reduction strategies.

A few of the speakers and panellists were: Paul Seaborn, management professor, University of Virginia; Taylor Giovannini, chief executive officer and president of Oceanic Releaf, NL; and, Dr. Alia Norman, lead physician, Newfoundland CANABO Clinic. Join us for CHERP's inaugural webinar series


Public Engagement







Dr. Hai Nguyen Was Invited to Ottawa to Discuss His CIHR Grant on the Impacts of Alcohol Policies During COVID-19

On April 21, 2022, the Canadian Federal Minister of Mental Health and Addictions, the Honourable Carolyn Bennett announced almost \$2 million for research that will inform alcohol-related policies and interventions in Canada. You can read the CIHR's press release <u>here</u>.

One of the researchers who received funding was Dr. Hai Van Nguyen who will work with colleagues at Memorial University of Newfoundland to study the behavioural and health effects of alcohol policy changes during COVID-19 in Canada. Researchers will also examine interventions to prevent, treat, and reduce the harms of problematic alcohol use, as well as the effects of alcohol use and related health and psychosocial on specific populations and determinants of health. In June 2022, <u>SaferMedsNL</u> had an oral abstract accepted for the Excellence in Pharmacy Practice Research Sessions at the CPhA conference in Ottawa. The title of the presentation was, *Identifying strategies to support the implementation of a provincial deprescribing initiative, SaferMedsNL: Outcomes from focus groups with community pharmacists and prescribers in Newfoundland and Labrador.*

SaferMedsNL's pubic awareness campaign concluded in December 2021. Its main objective was to promote safe and effective medication use for people living in Newfoundland and Labrador.

Bronwyn Bridges Competed in the Global Student Entrepreneur Awards (GSEA) National Championships

This past July, Ms. Bridges, a PhD candidate at the School of Pharmacy, competed in the Global Student Entrepreneur Awards (GSEA) National Championships, held in Halifax, NS. Ms. Bridges competed with the company she co-founded with Gord Genge, PragmaClin, along with its flagship software PRIMS (Parkinson's Remote Interactive Monitoring System). The GSEA competition is open to Canadian student entrepreneurs.

Ms. Bridges finished second overall, receiving \$25,000, after delivering a live, 30-minute pitch to a panel of three judges.

As well, in the six months leading up to the publication of <u>Building 'Bridges'</u> in the Gazette, Ms. Bridges had won \$125,000 at various competitions many of which were for university student entrepreneurs and initiatives.

Dr. Hai Nguyen Named Fulbright Canada Research Chair

The associate professor and Canada Research Chair (Tier 2) in Health Policy Evaluation and Health Care Sustainability, School of Pharmacy, was named Fulbright Canada Research Chair in Public Health at Johns Hopkins University, an opportunity of a lifetime.

Dr. Nguyen spent four months conducting research at the Bloomberg School of Public Health in Maryland. He was initially supposed to travel to the U.S. the previous year, but the COVID-19 pandemic delayed his start date.

"My research will focus on evaluating the effects of Canada's recreational cannabis legalization," Dr. Nguyen

told the <u>Gazette</u> during a recent conversation. (Excerpts from Jeff Green's Gazette article on November 24, 2021)

Doing this research in the U.S. offers a unique advantage of using both Canada and U.S. data, enabling me to assess and compare the effects of this important policy between the two countries. —Dr. Hai Nguyen

Student, Olivia Perry, Won First Place in the Undergraduate Trainee Poster Award Competition

The School of Pharmacy would like to acknowledge and congratulate Olivia Perry for her firstplace win of the Undergraduate Trainee Poster Award at the CSPS Annual Symposium Poster Competition, sponsored by the Canadian Society of Pharmaceutical Sciences (CSPS).

Olivia originally presented her poster at the MUN School of Pharmacy Research Day in November 2021, where she was awarded Best Undergraduate Poster. This award allowed her to represent MUN and the School of Pharmacy as our undergraduate poster winner representative at the annual national CSPS symposium, held virtually on June 1-2, 2022. Seven undergraduate candidates were short-listed for the poster competition from across the country and given the opportunity to present in front of a panel of judges from across the country. Among those who presented on a range of pharmaceutical and clinical pharmacy research, Olivia was successful in winning the top award.



Olivia's poster was entitled, "Quantification of Neurovasculature Changes in a Post-Hemorrhagic Stroke Animal-Model." Her supervisors are Dr. Noriko Daneshtalab and Dr. Michael Doschak.
