## DEPARTMENT OF PHILOSOPHY: PER COURSE TEACHING POSITIONS Winter 2026

## ON CAMPUS

PHIL 1011 CRW in Ethics. One on-campus section for the Winter Term, 2026.

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course will focus on learning and practicing the fundamentals skills required for university-level critical reading and writing that will prepare students for other Arts courses regardless of discipline. The course will focus on foundational skills in how to differentiate ethical questions (how ought we to live?) from other types of reasoning. All sections of this course follow the Critical Reading and Writing Course Guidelines available at <a href="https://www.mun.ca/hss/crw">www.mun.ca/hss/crw</a>.

**QUALIFICATIONS:** A M.A. in Philosophy is required with demonstrable extensive study at the graduate level of philosophy. Proven teaching ability at post-secondary level is required. Previous experience teaching this course will be an asset

PHIL 2030 Logic. One on-campus section for the Winter Term, 2026.

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course is an introduction to traditional and modern logic.

**QUALIFICATIONS**: A M.A. in Philosophy is required with demonstrable extensive study at the graduate level of logic or related areas of Philosophy. Proven teaching ability at post-secondary level is required, specifically in the area of logic. Previous experience teaching this course will be an asset.

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PHIL 2215 History of Modern Philosophy. One on-campus section for the Winter Term, 2026.

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course is a survey of the development of Western philosophy since the 17th century until the late 18th century

**QUALIFICATIONS:** A M.A. in Philosophy is required with demonstrable extensive study at the graduate level of philosophy. Proven teaching ability at post-secondary level is required. Previous experience teaching this course will be an asset

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## **DISTANCE COURSES**

PHIL 2100 HEALTH ETHICS. Two distance sections for the Winter Term, 2026.

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course examines concepts of health and illness and their ethical implications.

**QUALIFICATIONS:** A M.A. in Philosophy is required with demonstrable extensive study at the graduate level in philosophy or related areas in philosophy such as philosophy of health and health ethics. Proven teaching ability at post-secondary level is required. Recent experience with distance course delivery is preferred.

All candidates are asked to complete an application form for per course teaching available online at the departmental website (<a href="www.mun.ca/phil/">www.mun.ca/phil/</a>) or from the departmental office (AA3069-70). Along with the application form, applicants not on the Philosophy seniority list are asked to provide a copy of their C.V. and the names of two references.

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PHIL 2140 MEDIA ETHICS. One distance section for the Winter Term, 2026.

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course examines ethical issues and dilemmas arising in the realm of the mass media, within the context of foundational ethical theories and major philosophies of mass communication. Topics include the nature and structure of mass communication, the public sphere, and the role of the media in a functioning democracy. Subtopics include: propaganda, censorship, freedom of speech, and access to information and communication.

**QUALIFICATIONS:** A M.A. in Philosophy is required with demonstrable extensive study at the graduate level of the philosophy of media ethics. Proven teaching ability at post-secondary level is required. Recent experience with distance course delivery is preferred.
