Fall Convocation, Grenfell Campus Dr. Gary Kachanoski, President and Vice-Chancellor: Thursday, October 6, 2016

Good morning everyone!

Welcome to our 2016 fall convocation for Grenfell Campus, Memorial University. We are so pleased that you have joined us for what is always a special time in the life of a university, a time when we celebrate the success of our students.

So, of course, a special welcome and congratulations to every one of you, our graduating students.

I know that your parents, families, friends and professors all played supporting roles in your success, but make no mistake – ultimately it was your dedication, hard work and talent that brought you here today, so congratulations on your accomplishments.

Ladies and gentlemen, please join me in congratulating all of our graduating students.

Every degree conferred this morning is the result of a personal journey requiring significant commitment and work, and by itself is worthy of considerable accolades as an important milestone in each student's life.

In September, competing as Team Canada against 35 other national teams at the World Cup international competition in Toronto, they were once again crowned world champions. To put this in perspective, there were 1,700 university campuses competing for 36 national teams and one world champion – Memorial University. We couldn't be more proud.

We had hoped to be joined today by a special guest, Dr. Frank Hayden, who was scheduled to receive an honorary doctor of laws this morning. Unfortunately, Dr. Hayden is unable to be here today and will be conferred with an honorary degree at our spring convocation in 2017 here in Corner Brook.

I would like to acknowledge and welcome Ms. Iris Petten, chair of Memorial University's Board of Regents who joins us on stage this morning. Ms. Petten is a dedicated and passionate supporter of our university. All of our regents – a number of them are here today – volunteer their time and contribute significantly to our university. Would you please join me welcoming and thanking our regents.

I want to take this opportunity to acknowledge a very sad event, the sudden passing of a true gentleman and champion for Memorial University. I am speaking of Dr. Richard Marceau who came to Memorial in 2013 as our vice-president (research), after a distinguished career as an academic and professional engineer.

During his short time with us he worked tirelessly to not only enhance Memorial's research capacity but all aspects of Memorial so that this university and its people can continue to positively impact the world around us. Daily his personal approach was the same — bringing a kind and positive outlook to the challenges and opportunities of academia, as well as the challenges that life brings us all. He was a great friend to many in the university community and beyond, and he will certainly be missed.

Ladies and gentlemen, as president of Memorial University for the past six years, it has been an honour to personally connect with this campus and this community and experience the positive impact of important and strategic initiatives and investments at Grenfell, and share each of these successes with our extended community here on the west coast.

There is so much to be proud of as we look back at more than four decades of university education here on the west coast of Newfoundland.

Grenfell's success and upward trajectory is due in no small part to the great work being done by our Vice-President (Grenfell Campus), Dr. Mary Bluechardt and her senior academic leadership team.

Dr. Bluechardt was re-appointed this past year for a second five-year term, and based on her record to date, we are sure that she will continue to provide visible, innovative and visionary leadership to Grenfell Campus, specifically, and to the entire university. One important and recent development at Grenfell, with leadership from Dr. Bluechardt, is the change to a decanal academic structure of deans and schools. This academic structure better reflects Grenfell's rightful place among peer university campuses across Canada. So today I'm pleased to formally welcome a number of new people to our senior leadership team at Grenfell.

Dr. Michelle Piercey-Normore, is our new dean of science and the environment (Grenfell). Dr. Piercey-Normore was associate head (Department of Biological Sciences) at the University of Manitoba prior to coming to Grenfell.

Dr. Laura Robinson is our new dean of arts and social science (Grenfell).Prior to her appointment she was dean of arts (interim) at the Royal MilitaryCollege of Canada.

Finally, I am also pleased to welcome Mr. Scott Porter to his first convocation. Scott is our new associate vice-president (finance and administration) (Grenfell Campus). He came to us from Fanshawe College of Applied Arts and Technology, one of Ontario's largest colleges, where he was vice-president, finance and administration. In addition to welcoming our new senior leaders, I want to thank two individuals who agreed to take on additional senior roles here at Grenfell over the past year. Ladies and gentlemen, our universities unique origin, our vision, mission and core values, paint a picture of who we were, who were are and what we aspire to become.

Memorial is focused on meeting the needs of our students, developing innovative living and learning spaces, building and renewing appropriate infrastructure for 21<sup>st</sup> century teaching, research and public engagement, and making a difference in our communities by contributing to the social, cultural and economic development of our great province.

The university embodies the aspirations of those who founded Memorial University College – to be a living legacy to those who paid the ultimate price for our freedom in the First World War and in subsequent conflicts. A living legacy dedicated to the advancement of our society through education.

This year, we continue to mark the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the First World War period and in particular this past July, the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the conflict at Beaumont Hamel. The Danger Tree sculpture and new memorial site located on our Grenfell Campus that was officially unveiled by Her Royal Highness, the Princess Royal, is certainly a powerful symbol of our university`s unique origin.
