Fall Convocation Dr. Gary Kachanoski, President and Vice-Chancellor: Friday, October 2, 2015

Good morning everyone!

Welcome to our 2015 fall convocation for Grenfell Campus, Memorial University. We are so pleased that you have joined us for what is always a special time in the life of a university, a time when we celebrate the success of our students.

So, of course, a special welcome and congratulations to every one of you, our graduating students.

I know that your parents, families, friends and professors all played supporting roles in your success, but make no mistake – ultimately it was your dedication, hard work and talent that brought you here today, so congratulations on your accomplishments.

Ladies and gentlemen, please join me in congratulating all of our graduating students.

I would like to acknowledge and welcome Mary Cormier who joins us on stage this morning. Mary is a dedicated member of our Board of Regents and is representing our board chair, Iris Petten, who unfortunately could not join us for convocation this morning. All of our Board of Regents members volunteer their time and contribute significantly to our university, would you please join me welcoming and acknowledging them. Also on stage is a special guest, one whom we are all pleased will soon join the ranks of distinguished individuals named as honorary graduates of Memorial University.

I am speaking of the Honourable Robert Wells, Rhodes Scholar, public servant, lawyer, government minister, justice of Newfoundland and Labrador's Supreme Court.
