The course schedule will be determined by the Psy.D. Program Director in consultation with the instructor. The Calendar description is:

Psychology 7020 Practicum in Adult Assessment and Diagnosis I: This course provides an introduction to adult psychometric assessment. Students build skills in conducting semi-structured interviews and administering and interpreting a selected battery of psychometric tests. The students work under supervision in the Psychology Department clinic and attend a weekly seminar/lab.

Required qualifications: (1) A demonstrated knowledge of the specific topics noted in the course description; (2) a doctorate in a relevant discipline (e.g., pharmacy; psychology; clinical neuroscience); and (3) Demonstrated experience with medications in clinical psychology. Preference will be given to applicants who have appropriate provincial registration/licensure.
