Applications are invited from qualified individuals who are interested in being considered for a position as a per course instructor teaching Psychology 7034 *Practicum in Advanced Assessment and Intervention II* in Winter semester 2019 on the St. John's campus. The course meeting time is still to be scheduled.

The course provides supervised training in an approved clinical setting, with an emphasis on the development of advanced assessment and intervention skills in a second area of specialization. The practicum requires that students spend 15 hours per week for 12 weeks depth in students' clinical experience. The practicum requires that students spend 15 hours per week for 12 weeks working under supervision in an approved clinical setting and attend a weekly seminar.

Required qualifications: (1) A demonstrated knowledge of the specific topics noted in the course description; (2) a doctorate in clinical psychology or a masters in clinical psychology with at least 4 years of teaching experience in a professional training program in either clinical psychology or psychiatry; and (3) appropriate provincial registration/licensure.
