108. REPORT OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES

108.1 School of Nursing

Page 319, 2009-2010 Calendar, following the heading 3.1.2 Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) Fast-Track Option Program, add the following new heading 3.1.3 Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) LPN Bridging Option Program and re-number subsequent headings accordingly:

"3.1.3 Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) LPN Bridging Option Program

The BN (Collaborative) Program LPN Bridging Option provides a career ladder for LPNs. It offers students a combination of 25 unspecified transfer nursing credit hours for (a) the successful completion of a nursing bridging course taken during the Bridging Semester and (b) the recognition of prior nursing knowledge and clinical experience obtained through previous LPN education and work experiences. The Nursing Bridging course will prepare students to enter the second year of the degree program, thereby decreasing the length of the program and its inherent costs.

The School of Nursing depends on the cooperation and involvement of a large number of organizations and professional personnel in providing quality clinical placements and instruction to its students. These agencies often have a range of requirements, some of which include, a Certificate of Conduct, a Child Protection Record Check, immunizations, a First Aid Certificate, and a CPR certificate. Students unable to meet these agency requirements, may be delayed in their program or prevented from completing their program of studies. All students are required to complete these requirements in a timely fashion and at their own expense. Many of these requirements must be updated annually. In order to satisfy clinical practice requirements for the Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) program, clinical agencies may be used 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Students may be required to attend during any of these times.

This program is offered at the Centre for Nursing Studies. Information regarding the Centre for Nursing Studies is available at www.cns.nf.ca/."

Page 319, 2009-2010 Calendar, amend the first sentence of <u>4.1 General Information</u>, clause 1 to read as follows:

"1. Entry to the Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) four year Fast-Track Option, the LPN Bridging option and to the Bachelor of Nursing (Post-RN) Nurse Practitioner Primary Health Care Option are competitive for a limited number of placements."

School of Nursing (cont'd)

Page 319, 2009-2010 Calendar, under the heading <u>4.1 General Information</u>, add a new clause 5 as follows:

- "5. Admission to the Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) LPN Bridging Option is on the basis of competition for a limited number of seats. Selection of candidates will be based on:
 - academic performance in the practical nursing program and in any university courses taken to date.
 - evidence of ability to successfully maintain a full course load.
 - other criteria considered suitable for professional practice in nursing.

Admission to the program is denied to any student if, in the judgment of the Joint Admissions Committee, s/he is deemed unsuitable for admission.

Applicants must provide two letters of reference (one reference regarding academic performance and one from a current employer regarding clinical performance)."

Page 319, 2009-2010 Calendar, under the heading <u>4.1 General Information</u>, amend clause 8 to read as follows:

"8. Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) Fast-Track, Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) LPN Bridging Option program and Bachelor of Nursing (Post-RN) Nurse Practitioner Primary Health Care applicants may be requested to attend an interview."

Page 320, 2009-2010 Calendar, under the heading <u>4.2 Application Forms and Deadlines</u>, amend clauses 1 and 2 to read as follows:

- "1. All programs and their options, other than Bachelor of Nursing (Post-RN) distance option, commence in the Fall semester. The deadline for application to the Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) Program, 4 year and Fast-Track 2 year option and Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) LPN Bridging Option Program is March 1st. The deadline for application for admission is March 1. The Bachelor of Nursing (Post-RN) program applications for admission are accepted on an ongoing basis. The deadline for admission to the Bachelor of Nursing (Post-RN) Nurse Practitioner Primary Health Care Option program is May 31.
- 2. Application forms are available in person from the Office of the Registrar or by writing the Office of the Registrar, Admissions Office, Memorial University of Newfoundland, St. John's, NL, A1C 5S7. "4.3.3 LPN Bridging Applicants

Applicants with a Licensed Practical Nurse designation may apply for admission to the Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) LPN Bridging Option program.

- 1. To be considered for admission to the BN (Collaborative) LPN Bridging Option applicants must:
 - Be a graduate (2002 or later) of an approved Practical Nursing Program, Province of Newfoundland and Labrador
 - Be a Licensed Practical Nurse (copy of certification required)
 - Meet the General Admission Requirements of Memorial University and the Admission Requirements for the Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) Program
 - Have completed the following high school courses
 - i. Biology 2201 and 3201 or their equivalents
 - ii. Chemistry 3202 or equivalent
 - Admission into the second year of the BN (Collaborative) program will be conditional and based on successful completion of the Bridging Semester, which includes the following:
 - i. Biochemistry 1430 (Fall and Spring Offerings)
 - ii. Psychology 1000
 - iii. English (3 credit hours)
 - iv. A Nursing Bridging Course including human physiology and nursing concepts (Note: The pass mark for this course is 65%).

Plus

A Math Placement Test

A score of 50% on a Math Placement Test or Math 102FN or 3 credit hours in Math is a prerequisite for N2004."

- "5.3 Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) LPN Option Program
- 1. The Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) LPN Option Program is only offered at the Centre for Nursing Studies.
- 2. The three year and one semester 130 credit hour BN (Collaborative) LPN Option Program requires 69 NURS credit hours, one Bridging semester and 36 non-NURS credit hours.
- 3. The 130 credit hours are recommended to be taken in the academic terms in the sequence as set out in **Table 1**, **2**, **or 3 Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) Program**. These courses will be offered during the same year at all sites, but the semester of course offering may vary with each site.
- 4. Selected nursing courses which are designed for the Bachelor of Nursing (Post-RN) program may be used as electives in the Bachelor of Nursing (Collaborative) program with permission of the Committee on Undergraduate Studies and the course instructor.

3011 Intermediate Macro Theory II is a consideration of modern theories of macroeconomics, dynamics, empirical evidence and simulation of the national economy. Emphasis on the availability and effectiveness of government policy instruments.

PR: Economics 3010.

3030 International Economics: Issues and Problems in a Canadian Context is an intermediate......Economics 2020.

3050 Economic Forecasting: Methods and Applications aims to present......is recommended.

3080 Natural Resource and Environmental Economics is application of economic analysis to renewable and nonrenewable natural resource industries such as the fishery, forestry, and mining. Emphasis is given to the criteria for optimal resource use under various market structures and their implications for public policy. Issues of environmental resource management and pollution control will also be covered.

PR: Economics 2010 and Economics 2020.

3085 Issues in Ecological Economics (same as Economics 3085) aims to explore the dynamic interaction between the economic system and the ecological system that sustains it by using trans-disciplinary theoretical approaches and methodologies. The main focus of this course will be on Ecological Economics concepts such as low and high entropy, biotic and abiotic goods and services, stock-flow resources, carrying capacity, throughput, co-evolution, sustainable scale, use value, and their applications in a problem-solving context.

PR/CO: Economics 2010 and Economics 2020

CR: Credit may not be obtained for both Environmental Studies/Economics 3085 and the former Environmental Studies 3010 and Environmental Studies 4020.

110. <u>REPORT OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES</u>

110.1 Enhancing Academic Performance

A memorandum dated April 17, 2009, was received from Senate Committee on Undergraduate Studies, proposing the introduction of the following new program in the Faculty of Arts - Enhancing Academic Performance.

Professor Walsh explained that the program is designed to help students in academic difficulty who have been required to withdraw acquire skills that will improve their ability to resume and complete successfully their undergraduate academic career. It is proposed that a pilot project be offered in the Fall 2009 semester to students who, at the end of the Winter 2009 Semester, fail the requirements for Eligibility for Continuance and would thus normally be required, under General Academic Regulations 4.10.3 to withdraw from the University for two or more semesters. Students admitted to the program and who confirm in writing their willingness to participate would be readmitted to the University for the Fall 2009 Semester.

It was moved by Professor Walsh, seconded by Mr. Collins, and carried that the proposal be approved.

110.2 <u>Invigilation Procedures</u>

A memorandum dated April 8, 2009, was received from Senate Committee on Undergraduate Studies, indicating that in January 2009 the Committee considered the Report of the Sub-Committee to Review Regulations governing Academic Misconduct and Invigilation Procedures and forwarded the proposed changes to General Academic Regulation 4.11 ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT for the approval of Senate at that time.

The Senate Committee on Undergraduate Studies has reported that it has finalized and approved the Invigilation Procedures and is now forwarding this documentation, which includes Guidelines for Students Regarding the Conduct of Final Examinations and Procedures for the Conduct of Examinations, for appropriate action of Senate.

During discussion, the following is a summary of the many comments and concerns expressed by Senators regarding these documents:

- Objections to the possibility that students might incur additional costs associated with providing invigilators for Distance Education courses.
- Suggestions that other suitable photo identification cards, in addition to the Memorial photo identification card should be acceptable.
- While the Procedures state that students are not permitted to speak to one another once the examination has commenced, several Senators noted that some examinations in the Faculty of Medicine require communication between students.
- The Procedures state that use of all communication devices is prohibited during the examination. Senators asked whether or not devices that are not communication devices are permitted.

Invigilation Procedures (cont'd)

• It was suggested that the procedures should be more generalized to accommodate the varying requirements of different faculties and schools.

It was moved by Professor Walsh, seconded by Professor Kuester, and carried by majority vote that the presented procedures be approved with the following amendments which were considered by the mover and seconder to be friendly:

In item 3, at the end of the first sentence just before "etc", insert "... and other items required for the examination,".

At the end of item numbers 4 and 5, add "unless part of the examination process."

Change the titles of the procedures to "Instructions for Students Regarding the Conduct of Examinations in Central Locations" and "Procedures for the Conduct of Examinations in Central Locations."

By a show of hands the motion carried by a majority vote.

In the memorandum dated April 15, 2009, the Committee reported that in the eleven constituencies where vacancies existed, an extension of the deadline for nominations resulted in four nominations being received in addition to the eight nominations received in the first call. In four constituencies where vacancies still existed, a second extension of the deadline resulted in one more nomination being received. The end result is that while 14 seats have been filled, four vacancies remain as noted above. The Committee on Senate Elections recommends that these vacancies stand until there is a call for a by-election from eligible voters or until the next cycle of Senate elections whichever occurs earlier.

The motion was carried by majority vote with Professor Walsh and Mr. Despres abstaining from voting.
