Complementary Studies is a collection of non-social work courses that provides students with opportunities to gain general knowledge of people and nature, develop analytical and critical thinking and communication skills, and explore the intersections of social, political, and economic elements in society. The six learning objectives and approved courses are listed in the table below.

- Students are required to successfully complete Complementary Studies courses as part of the admission requirement for the First and Second Degree programs. Admissions requirements for the BSW First Degree and BSW Second Degree are located in the University Calendar which outlines the courses required from complementary studies for each program.
- Once admitted to the BSW First Degree program, students must complete a total of 18 credit hours of courses selected from Complementary Studies which is outlined in the Program Regulations.
- The approved list of courses for each learning objective is maintained by the Office of the Associate Dean, Undergraduate Programs, of the School of Social Work. Updates of approved or removed courses will happen in consultation with the appropriate committee(s) responsible for undergraduate curriculum.
- Listed courses are subject to change and availability.
- Students in the First Degree program are permitted to use approved courses listed on the Social Work website for degree regulations subsequent to their year of entry to the Bachelor of Social Work Degree.
