

**Per Course Instructor Teaching Opportunities – Spring 2024 Memorial
University of Newfoundland
Faculty of Humanities & Social Sciences; Department of Sociology, Criminology**

Subject to sufficient enrolment and budgetary restrictions, the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences may appoint several Per Course Instructors to teach courses in Criminology in the Spring 2024 semester. Letters of application, along with curriculum vitae, a teaching dossier and the names and contact information of three referees should be submitted to Dr. Rochelle Côté, Interim Head, Department of Sociology by **Friday, February 23**. All required information must be received before applications will be considered; applicants are responsible for ensuring that their application files are complete. Two-years' experience teaching in the respective area of criminology/criminal justice and in distance education is also preferred.

CRIM 1001 / SOCI 1001 – Introduction to Criminology (two sections online)

The Department of Sociology, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences at Memorial University is seeking an instructor for CRIM 1001, Introduction to Criminology. This course introduces students to sociological and criminological theories and research methods for understanding the phenomenon of “crime”. As a background for developing theory, this course familiarizes students with the challenges associated with defining and researching “crime”. Along with a critical examination of the different theories and methods in criminology, students consider the implications for policy. Applicants are required to have a minimum of a Master’s degree in Criminology or a related discipline (e.g., Sociology, Police Studies); a PhD in the related discipline is preferred and experience in the criminal justice system is an asset.

CRIM 2200 – Introductions to Corrections (one section online)

The Department of Sociology, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences at Memorial University is seeking an instructor for CRIM 2200, Introduction to Corrections. Applicants are required to have a minimum of a Master’s degree in Criminology or a related discipline (e.g., Sociology, Police Studies); a PhD in the related discipline is preferred and correctional experience is an asset. CRIM 2200 requires an in-depth knowledge of the criminal justice system in Canada, familiarity with the history of punishment and corrections, understanding of professionals’ roles and responsibilities in the justice system, the purpose of prison, the classification of prisoners, knowledge of prisoner subculture and violence inside prisons, and community corrections.

CRIM 2400 Introduction to Policing (one section online)

The Department of Sociology, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences at Memorial University is seeking an instructor for CRIM 2400, An Introduction to Policing. Applicants are required to have a minimum of a Master’s degree in Criminology, Police Studies, or another related discipline (e.g., Sociology); a PhD in the related discipline is preferred and policing experience is an asset. CRIM 2400 requires knowledge of the history and development of policing in Canada, an understanding of policing theory and models of policing, in-depth familiarity with police organizations and structures in Canada, familiarity with policing roles and responsibilities, including police decision making, exercise of powers, use of discretion, recruitment and training, the professional role as well as their role in the broader criminal justice system, organizational and operational stress, and policing in a diverse society, and knowledge of policing as a profession and as an area of research.

CRIM 3100 – Gender, Crime and Criminology (one section online)

The Department of Sociology, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences at Memorial University is seeking an instructor for CRIM 3100, Gender, Crime and Criminology. Applicants are required to have a minimum of a Master's degree in Criminology, Police Studies, or another related discipline (e.g., Sociology); a PhD in the related discipline is preferred and policing experience is an asset. CRIM 3100 requires in-depth knowledge of the gendered aspects of criminal offending, victimization, criminal justice responses (i.e., police, courts, corrections), and workers in the criminal justice system.

All qualified candidates are encouraged to apply. However, priority will be given to Canadian citizens and permanent residents of Canada. Memorial University is committed to employment equity and encourages applications from qualified women and men, visible minorities, aboriginal people and people with disabilities.
