Resume/Cover Letter Critiques

 As you prepare your job applications, use Career Development's <u>Resume and</u> <u>Cover Letter Guide</u> to perfect your resume and cover letter and get your application noticed.

- The Career Development Office offers drop-in resume clinics every semester.

Interview Preparation

- Nervous about interviews? Need advice on interview techniques? Preparation is key to overcome interview jitters! Career Development has <u>resources</u> available to help you prepare for a job interview and review common behavioral interview questions.
- Practice mock interviews through **InStage**. an AI-powered mock interview software available to student. Students can receive feedback that they can use to improve their interview performance and make a positive impression.

Creating Your LinkedIn Profile

- It is important for graduates to have an active LinkedIn profile before (and after) graduating to help them network, establish connections, and build their online presence.
- Current students and alumni can book an appointment with a Career Advisor through Microsoft Bookings to receive a review of their LinkedIn profile.
- The Career Development Office offers LinkedIn workshops during the semester. Visit the **Student Life Calendar** regularly for upcoming workshops.

Skill Building

- Attend a workshop facilitated by Career Development to help you advance your career! Sessions are offered throughout the semester on a variety of topics, including LinkedIn, Campus to Career, and skill building. Workshop schedules are available on the <u>Student Life Calendar</u>.
- Topics include LinkedIn, Resume and Cover Letter Writing, and Campus to Career.
- Always look out for professional development opportunities, especially those that are of low or no cost. For example, LinkedIn Learning offers courses on topics including artificial intelligence (AI), Excel, creative thinking and more. Coursera offers free courses on topics including graphic design, business, social sciences, and more.

Job Search Jumpstart Miniseries (Virtual and In-Person Options) – May 5 & 6, 2025

Learn how to tailor your application materials to stand out, discover effective job search strategies, gain confidence and showcase your talents on LinkedIn. The video series is aimed to help upcoming and new graduates as they transition from classroom to career. Sessions focus on storytelling, career planning, job search, and career resources.

Breaking Barriers to Employment

Are you a recent or upcoming graduate with a disability who is experience barriers to employment? Connect with a Career Advisor to explore possible ways to reach your full potential and achieve your career goals. Current students can book an appointment through <u>Microsoft Bookings</u>. Alumni can email <u>careerdevelopment@mun.ca</u> to schedule an appointment with a Career Advisor.

Graduate Transition to Employment Program (GTEP)

- Administered by Career Development, <u>GTEP (Graduate Transition to Employment</u> <u>Program</u>) is an incentive for employers in Newfoundland and Labrador to hire Memorial University graduates, providing \$6,250 of the starting salary of an approved position for a period of 26 weeks. Graduates can use GTEP when approaching employers of interest as an incentive and sales tool to garner full-time career-related employment.
- Memorial University graduates who have successfully completed a post-secondary program (minimum duration of one year) and are currently unemployed or

underemployed (ie. Working less than 20 hours per week or not in an area related to their study) are eligible to apply.

Labour Market Information (LMI)

Arm yourself with Labour Market Information to stay informed on current job trends and occupations. Use LMI to help you prepare for job interviews (salary ranges) and review and research current data/information on career options, educational opportunities, and employment outlooks.
